
## **HISTORY OF HAYWOOD KNOLLS – 1983**

## "THE DEBT WE OWE"

In 2011, we continue to celebrate THE 30<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY of the HAYWOOD KNOLLS ASSOCIATION and THE 25<sup>th</sup> YEAR since its INCORPORATION. This is the second in a five-part series that relates the history of the Haywood Knolls subdivision from its beginning in 1981 through the Haywood Knolls Association's incorporation in 1986.

Remember, in October, 1982, the first edition of the Haywood Knolls Notes appeared....



And by November, 1982, the first block captain was designated – Bob and Betty Carroll responsible for "The North".

By December, 1982, the directory had 70 family listings, an increase of 14 listings from June.

In April, 1983, the State Department of Highways dedicated Haywood Knolls Drive – up to #180 (Harvey Newhall's house), Morning Dew Lane and part of Surry Lane (up to what is now Park Lane) as State Road. Harry Newhall was to become the Chairman of the Roads Committee to finally get yellow lines painted on the designated roads.

Several hundred pine trees were planted by Don Thompson at the gate area and stop signs were placed on Morning Dew and at the Route 191 entrance.

On June 22, 1983, at the third annual meeting of the Haywood Knolls Residents Association, held at the Meadows Community Center at West 3<sup>rd</sup> and Justice Streets, 85 members attended. Tom Hodgman was elected President; Liz Craig as Vice President;

Laura Chalfin as Secretary; and Fred Burton as Treasurer. Ralph Morris, having arrived in 1982, and Harry Prosser were elected Directors and Grace Hay became Past President. There were now 85 resident families, a 52% increase from the year before, with the June, 1983 Directory listing 97 names. By December, 1983, another 23 families had moved in.

The proposed budget for the year was now \$1443.

Oxford Lane (now Arbor Lane) remained unpaved, but Donald Thompson agreed to be responsible for plowing the subdivision roads as long as he was still building. But there were numerous complaints from residents attending the annual meeting about the dirt, trailers, and uncontrolled wild driving of Thompson's construction crews on the roads, particularly the front end loaders. Other problems in the subdivision included vandalism of mail boxes and loitering of youths.

Talk of covenant restrictions for trailers on lots was rampant among the membership and incorporation was being considered by the Association but was "not definitive".

A "Welcoming Committee" was formed – for distribution of the Directory and Community Watch material. Ruth Webbert was assisted by Enola Johnson and Fred Burton.

And for the first time, the Haywood Knolls Annual picnic was held in August in the tennis court area in what was to become Newhall Park.

The hiking group was growing and the first formal hiking schedule was started by Liz Craig, Harvey Newhall, and Ralph Morris – advertised as five to six easy hikes in the Pisgah Forest. As many as 40-50 regular hikers were the norm after that, meeting at Don Thompson's office inside the entrance area with hikes in South Carolina and all of the surrounding National Forests.





The Third annual Christmas party was held at the Woodfield Inn on December 15, 1983.

The directory now had 112 family listings, an increase of 60% from December, 1982.
